261. Declarations of Interest

262. Minutes of Last Meeting on 3rd August 2017

Minutes of the last meeting on 3rd August 2017 were approved as an accurate record.

263. Slough Canal - updates

Slough Canal Action Group are working on an agreement with CRT to lease the triangle of land at Goodman Park which suffers from vandalism, severe littering and fly tipping on a regular basis. The agreement will mean that the council can enter the CRT land and clear it and make small improvements when a budget is available.

Local Access Forum - 14.12.17

JW stated that legal have been instructed to look at the terms of the agreement with a view to getting it signed in the near future. A break clause is to be included.

TH stated that the land had been fenced cheaply, landscaped and a path put in. Unfortunately over time the fence has become broken and out of repair, the landscaping has become overgrown and anti-social behaviour happens. TH suggested that removing vegetation and fencing entirely would reduce the maintenance costs, however, there is still the ecological loss of natural habitat to be considered.

A water based risk assessment was done in November 2017 with a view to piloting a project to have water based activities such as; kayaking and paddle boarding on the canal aimed 11 + year olds. The risk assessment outcome was that from Uxbridge Road to Middlegreen Road would be the best section of the canal for activities with paddle boarding rejected due to the higher risk of falling in and the shallowness of the water with unknown hazards. There was a huge amount of plastic bags and cans in the canal which are difficult to see from the towpath.

TH confirmed that the dredging in 2014 was limited with only a central channel being dredged.

The problem of littering underneath the Wexham Road footbridge was discussed with JW proposing that a mesh cage is erected over the footbridge to prevent people throwing rubbish over the side. Rough sleeping at this location and at various points along the canal is also recognised as a major issue and the Action group is seeking to work together with CRT and the Resilience team at the council on this.

JW is looking at getting a specialist cleaning company to quote for clearing the litter at this location. There are health and safety issues in asking volunteers to tackle this section due to needles.

Members felt that the fencing of the Tiling Company should be removed now rather than wait for the regeneration to happen. However, any work to remove the fencing on this narrow section would not affect the difference in levels which would require a lot more investment than simply removing the fence and is not realistic at the moment.

JW agreed to seek an update from the SUR on when the planning permission will be submitted with a new design and when this will be consulted on.

Members agreed the proposed draft work programme and that site visits would be agreed for 2018 at the next meeting.

265. Local Cycle and Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP)

More details on this Local Walking and Cycling Infrastructure Plan would be brought to future meetings.

266. Possible Closures of FP57 and FP35b

After discussing the results of the door knocking exercise with residents of Glentworth Place, members agreed that the closure of FP57 due to anti-social behaviour problems needed to be taken forward either as a permanent stopping up order or as a Public Spaces Protection Order.

267. Berkyn Manor Farm FP

JW would send details of this new footpath in Colnbrook around to members with a view to taking a position on this and deciding on any action at the next meeting.

JW agreed to circulate the managed motorway presentation to LAF members.

Transport for Slough's Better by... scheme provides diverse, sustainable travel options throughout the borough

Transport for Slough is transforming the way we travel throughout the borough with its <u>Better by...</u> campaign.

The scheme is set to enable and encourage workplaces, schools and the wider community to use environmentally-friendly forms of travel, including public transport, cycling and walking routes.

The initiative will additionally help boost the local economy by enhancing access to jobs, skills, training and education and improve the health and wellbeing of Slough residents.

The programme began after Transport for Slough received £1.5million in funding from the Department for Transport's <u>Access Fund for Sustainable Travel</u>.

Building on the legacy of the <u>Local Sustainable Transport Fund (LSTF)</u>, which improved Slough's connectivity and network efficiency, and therefore travel choices for 25,000 employees and 15,000 pupils, the Better by... project looks to maintain and build on the achievements of the LSTF through four key objectives to be achieved over the next two years and beyond:

- increase cycling and walking in Slough to improve personal health
- up-skill the Slough workforce by enhancing access to local jobs and training
- encourage a switch from car use to sustainable travel for work and school trips to help offset the effects of road traffic in Slough
- promote sustainable travel opportunities offered by the Local Growth Fund and other capital schemes in Slough.

Slough's Better by... team is rolling out a number of sustainable travel events across the borough at key locations and within schools and businesses. This includes community engagement events and awareness campaigns:

- one-to-one cycle training and scooter training for children and adults across the borough
- group cycle rides on leisure and commuter routes around the borough
- bike surgeries free bicycle checks, minor repairs and maintenance advice for members of the public, schools and employees
- journey planning for jobseekers, youths seeking education and training opportunities for employees and residents
- cycling and walking competitions and competitive events
- travel planning advice for schools and businesses
- targeted road safety awareness and advice
- promoting mode-shift to car sharing, passenger transport and cycling and walking
- advising businesses on implementing cycle to work schemes and achieving travel plan targets
- providing matched funding to businesses to implement sustainable transport facilities such

as cycle parking, shower facilities etc

- access to and promotion of the Cycle Hire Slough and Cycle Hub Slough schemes
- production and distribution of information on our activities, infrastructure, routes and events
- wayfinding totems to advise members of the public and highlight key attractions in Slough.

Councillor Martin Carter, cabinet member for planning and transport, said: "I am very excited for Better by...'s many and varied schemes taking place in the borough. From the cycling programmes to the journey planning and travel advice, Better by... will be all about providing a range of sustainable travel options, while helping people to get out and enjoy the outdoors, as well as improve their fitness."

What is Slough Borough Council's Travel Training?

Background

The Travel Training Programme is part of Slough Borough Council's Access Fund Programme, 'Better by', which runs from 2017-2020. The Council was awarded funding from a £60 million Government fund to deliver projects to help reduce congestion, improve health and improve sustainable access to jobs, education and training opportunities. The Council are excited by this great opportunity and are looking forward to making a positive difference to the Borough's residents through the Better by project.

The Travel Training Service

Travel Training is a key part of the 'Better By' project and aims to break down travel barriers to accessing employment and training, and assist jobseekers and young people with both travel to interviews and initial employment.

Travel training is delivered through a **free focussed training session**, provided through the Better by team.



The session focuses on building confidence and the knowledge base of jobseekers and young people so that they know where to access transport information and find travel options that are easier, more flexible and possibly cheaper.

Our Travel Training session involves:

- Signposting and options for referral to transport partners e.g. Slough Cycle Hire;
- Group exercises to challenge barriers to transport and build confidence;
- A workbook with a travel planning scenario exercise and/or travel quiz; and
- The opportunity for your staff to become able to deliver the session for future classes.

A training session typically lasts 1.5- 2 hours and can be tailored to a group's ability and time available to deliver the session.

A special 'grappling' team cleared the bottom of the canal.

The Canal and Rivers Trust provided a boat to collect all the rubbish for disposal.


Altogether 143 bags of litter were collected from the towpath, plus lots of rubbish from the canal. The larger items pulled out of the water included a trolley, an oven and a safe!

This was a huge effort by all involved and made a significant improvement to the environment all along the canal between the Canal Basin and Langley.

The event was organised by the Friends of Slough Canal and supported by SBC. The day started with a safety briefing and included light refreshments at the Salvation Army Hall.

How public access can be improved post Brexit

Proposals from the British Horse Society, Byways and Bridleways Trust, Open Spaces Society and Ramblers for the redirection of agricultural funds to give public benefit, October 2017

- 1 The United Kingdom's departure from the EU provides an opportunity to model funding schemes for agriculture to ensure that public money achieves maximum public benefit and promotes public wellbeing.
- 2 Public benefit should include public access, whether by paths or open access to land (freedom to roam), because such assets support local economies, and improve people's health, wellbeing and safety. Public access also helps to connect those who use paths for whatever reason (non-motorised transport, for health reasons and for recreation) and those who own and manage the land. Naturally we advocate the public exercise its rights and freedoms responsibly and with respect for landowners, land managers and other users.
- 3 Any new scheme should include financial support for landowners who provide additional access or improvements to existing access.

Proposal 1. Additional access

4 Payments should be available for the provision of new access, either along defined paths or as freedom to roam, or both. It should be well publicised. It should be targeted and selective, with bids from farmers and land managers assessed against criteria, such as public demand, achievement of the objectives of the rights of way improvement plan, linking up existing routes, or improvement of safety (for example, enabling walkers and riders to avoid using roads, especially those which are busy, or have limited visibility).

- 5 Encouragement should be given for creating bridleways or restricted byways so that maximum public benefit is provided. The provision of circular off-road routes is of particular benefit for equestrians as they limit the amount of riding on roads. In the case of access land, there could be an increased number of access points, or additional access points provided across boundaries within the access area, and the provision of higher rights access on access land.
- 6 Providing higher rights on existing rights of way (the difference in subsidy between footpaths and bridleways or restricted byways should be substantial to encourage upgrades where it is appropriate for all users).
- 7 Ideally the new access will be permanent, consisting of definitive rights of way, or land dedicated for access under section 16 of the Countryside and Rights of Way Act 2000 or as a village green under section 15(8) of the Commons Act 2006. Additional spreading room adjacent to the coastal path in England could be rewarded. However, long-term permissive access is often better than no access at all.

Proposal 2. Enhancing existing access

- 8 There should be rewards for enhancing existing access. For example, this could include:
 - improvement in path widths,
 - regularly mowing a headland path and preventing encroachment by vegetation,
 - mowing and marking a path across grass leys,
 - mowing, regrading and rolling green lanes,
 - improving the accessibility of gates and stiles,
 - additional or improved waymarking and signposting,
- 9 Enhancements of existing access would be optional extras which farmers and land managers could elect to adopt. They would be applied to existing public rights of way and access land, and the farmer would receive standard annual payments per length of path adopted. Because the enhancements would be applied to existing public rights of way and access land, farmers could opt into the scheme without prior negotiation, and the scheme would have low administration costs.

Proposal 3. Cross compliance

- 10 It is important that those who receive grants and have existing rights of way on their land should ensure that all legislation is complied with, keeping paths clear of obstruction, reinstating them after ploughing etc.
- 11 It will be necessary to work out a cross-compliance regime that is fair to both land managers and the public, once the future is clearer.





- Set and work towards a green space standard, so that everyone has access to a minimum amount of green space within a specified distance of their front door.
- Develop a Local Cycling Walking Infrastructure Plan, setting out a long-term approach to developing local walking networks.
- Set out both rights and responsibilities for users and owners of urban public spaces, regardless of ownership, to ensure the highest level of public access.
