## PREDETERMINATION/PREDISPOSITION - GUIDANCE

The Council often has to make controversial decisions that affect people adversely and this can place individual members in a difficult position. They are expected to represent the interests of their constituents and political party and have strong views but it is also a well established legal principle that members who make these decisions must not be biased nor must they have pre-determined the outcome of the decision. This is especially so in “quasi judicial” decisions in planning and licensing committees. This Note seeks to provide guidance on what is legally permissible and when members may participate in decisions. It should be read alongside the Code of Conduct.

### Predisposition

Predisposition is lawful. Members may have strong views on a proposed decision, and may have expressed those views in public, and still participate in a decision. This will include political views and manifesto commitments. The key issue is that the member ensures that their predisposition does not prevent them from consideration of all the other factors that are relevant to a decision, such as committee reports, supporting documents and the views of objectors. In other words, the member retains an “open mind”.

Section 25 of the Localism Act 2011 confirms this position by providing that a decision will not be unlawful because of an allegation of bias or pre-determination “just because” a member has done anything that would indicate what view they may take in relation to a matter relevant to a decision. However, if a member has done something more than indicate a view on a decision, this may be unlawful bias or predetermination so it is important that advice is sought where this may be the case.

### Pre-determination / Bias

Pre-determination and bias are unlawful and can make a decision unlawful. Predetermination means having a “closed mind”. In other words, a member has made his/her mind up on a decision before considering or hearing all the relevant evidence. Bias can also arise from a member’s relationships or interests, as well as their state of mind. The Code of Conduct’s requirement to declare interests and withdraw from meetings prevents most obvious forms of bias, e.g. not deciding your own planning application. However, members may also consider that a “non-pecuniary interest” under the Code also gives rise to a risk of what is called apparent bias. The legal test is: “whether the fair-minded and informed observer, having considered the facts, would conclude that there was a real possibility that the Committee was biased”. A fair minded observer takes an objective and balanced view of the situation but Members who think that they have a relationship or interest that may raise a possibility of bias, should seek advice.

This is a complex area and this note should be read as general guidance only. Members who need advice on individual decisions, should contact the Monitoring Officer.

**19. Revocation/Suspension of a Personal Licence**

The Following is a Part 1 summary of the case:

The Licensing Sub-Committee was asked to consider the Appellant was a fit and proper person to continue to hold a Personal Licence.

The Licensing Manager summarised the background to the case and discussed the relevant Policy and Legislative considerations. He advised Members that in December 2017, the Licensing Team were informed that

during a joint operation between the London Borough of Hillingdon and the West London Immigration Compliance Enforcement Team, officers found an individual employed at Muskan Food and Wine who was found to be an illegal overstayer in contravention of Section 24(1)(b)(i) of the Immigration Act 1971. Members were reminded that an Immigration Civil Penalty was regarded as a 'relevant offence' under Schedule 4 of the Licensing Act 2003 and as such Members had authority to revoke or suspend the Appellant's Personal Licence for a period of up to six months.

It was also brought to Members' attention that the Appellant had held two Premises' Licences which had both subsequently also been revoked by Hillingdon Borough Council.

The Sub-Committee carefully considered all the evidence at its disposal. In reaching its decision, the Sub-Committee's primary concern was promotion of the statutory licensing objectives and specifically the prevention of crime and disorder.

**Resolved** - That the Personal Licence be revoked in accordance with Section 132A(3)(b) and 132A(8) of the Licensing Act 2003.

Following introductions, the Chair asked all parties to confirm that they had received a copy of the paperwork. The Appellant informed the meeting that he had not received the relevant paperwork. The hearing was adjourned for 15 minutes to allow the Appellant an opportunity to read the paperwork. The Appellant was offered the opportunity to have the hearing adjourned but confirmed that he was happy to proceed.

The Licensing Sub-Committee was asked to consider whether Private Hire Driver (Reference 02-17) was a fit and proper person to continue to hold a Private Hire licence in Slough.

The Senior Licensing Officer, Melanie Sagar, summarised the background to the case and discussed the relevant Policy and Legislative considerations. Members were advised that the Sub-Committee could only allow an Applicant to hold a Licence if it was satisfied that the applicant was a 'fit and proper' person to do so.

The Sub-Committee were reminded that the Driver was the current holder of a Private Hire Driver Licence, issued by Slough Borough Council. It was noted that the Appellant had been stopped by Thames Valley Police in August 2017

with four passengers in his vehicle. Following the relevant checks, it was confirmed that the vehicle was unlicensed and uninsured for transporting passengers for hire and reward.

The Driver addressed the Sub-Committee, and presented evidence in mitigation, stating that he had offered his friend a lift home and that he did not know the other passengers in the car. It was confirmed that no payment had taken place.

The Sub-Committee carefully considered all the evidence at its disposal and found on balance that there was reasonable cause to find that the lift given to the passengers was by way of hire and reward.

**Resolved** - That Private Hire Driver's licence (ref 02-17) be suspended for a period of 6 months.

**1. CURRENT POSITION**

1.1 An application to vary Premises Licence has been made by Winckworth Sherwood Solicitor on behalf of the Premises Licence holder BP Oil UK Limited to vary the premises licence as follows:

1. To extend the hours for the sale of alcohol to 24 hours a day 7 days week.
2. To remove all the embedded restrictions set out in Annex 2 on the premises licence.
3. To remove all the conditions set out in Annex 2 on the premises licence.
4. To include the conditions set out in boxes B and E of Section M of the operating schedule.

1.2 A copy of the application to vary the premises licence is attached at **Appendix A**.

**2. BACKGROUND INFORMATION**

2.1 BP Oil UK Limited, Brands Hatch SF Connect, 575-581 London Road, Slough, SL3 8QF is the holder of Premises Licence **PL4508** issued by Slough Borough Council. A copy of the current premises licence is attached at **Appendix B**.

**3. REPRESENTATIONS RECEIVED**

3.1 Three individual formal representations and a petition objecting to the application have been received from the following:

- Other Persons (i.e. local residents)

3.2 Any person may make representations in relation to applications for the variation of a Premises Licence, so long as such representations relate to one or more of the licensing objectives and are not deemed to be frivolous or vexatious.

3.3 The individual representations detail concerns under the Licensing Objective as follows:

- **The Prevention of Public Nuisance**

*In summary - The immediate area already suffers from an accumulation of litter and noise associated with customers using the service station, noise from the service itself, comments of loud anti-social behaviour, and that the sale of alcohol as requested would contribute further to the existing problems.*

The individual representations are attached as **Appendix C**.

3.3 The petition received from local residents has been submitted relating to concerns quoting all 4 licensing objectives as follows;

- **The Prevention of Crime and Disorder**
- **Public Safety**
- **The Prevention of Public Nuisance**
- **The Protection of Children from Harm.**

*In summary - The area already suffers from a serious problem with large numbers of street Drinkers, associated nuisance and anti-social behaviour, as well as litter and public urination in public areas nearby, and a problem of drunken behaviour.*

The petition objecting to the application is attached at **Appendix D**.

3.4 There have not been any representations made from any of the Responsible Authorities including the Thames Valley Police and Neighbourhood Enforcement Team or from any other persons.

#### **4. RELEVANT GUIDANCE**

4.1 The committee must have regard to the amended Secretary of States guidance issued in April 2018 under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and in particular Chapters 9 (Determining applications) and 10 (Conditions attached to Premises Licences). Particular regard should be had to paragraphs 9.31 – 9.41 (Hearings) and 9.42 – 9.44 (Determining actions that are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives).

4.2 With regards to Relevant, Frivolous or Vexatious Representations the relevant sections of the Section 182 Guidance state the following:

**9.4** *A representation is “relevant” if it relates to the likely effect of the grant of the licence on the promotion of at least one of the licensing objectives. For example, a representation from a local businessperson about the commercial damage caused by competition from new licensed premises would not be relevant. On the other hand, a representation by a businessperson that nuisance caused by new premises would deter customers from entering the local area, and the steps proposed by the applicant to prevent that nuisance were inadequate, would be relevant. In other words, representations should relate to the impact of licensable*

*activities carried on from premises on the objectives. For representations in relation to variations to be relevant, they should be confined to the subject matter of the variation. There is no requirement for a responsible authority or other person to produce a recorded history of problems at premises to support their representations, and in fact this would not be possible for new premises.*

**9.5** *It is for the licensing authority to determine whether a representation (other than a representation from responsible authority) is frivolous or vexatious on the basis of what might ordinarily be considered to be vexatious or frivolous. A representation may be considered to be vexatious if it appears to be intended to cause aggravation or annoyance, whether to a competitor or other person, without reasonable cause or justification. Vexatious circumstances may arise because of disputes between rival businesses and local knowledge will therefore be invaluable in considering such matters. Licensing authorities can consider the main effect of the representation, and whether any inconvenience or expense caused by it could reasonably be considered to be proportionate.*

**9.6** *Frivolous representations would be essentially categorised by a lack of seriousness. Frivolous representations would concern issues which, at most, are minor and in relation to which no remedial steps would be warranted or proportionate.*

**9.7** *Any person who is aggrieved by a rejection of their representations on either of these grounds may lodge a complaint through the local authority's corporate complaints procedure. A person may also challenge the authority's decision by way of judicial review.*

**9.8** *Licensing authorities should not take decisions about whether representations are frivolous, vexatious or relevant to the licensing objectives on the basis of any political judgement. This may be difficult for councillors who receive complaints from residents within their own wards. If consideration is not to be delegated, contrary to the recommendation in this Guidance, an assessment should be prepared by officials for consideration by the sub-committee before any decision is taken that necessitates a hearing. Any councillor who considers that their own interests are such that they are unable to consider the matter independently should disqualify themselves.*

**9.9** *It is recommended that, in borderline cases, the benefit of the doubt about any aspect of a representation should be given to the person making that representation. The subsequent hearing would then provide an opportunity for the person or body making the representation to amplify and clarify it.*

**9.10** *Licensing authorities should consider providing advice on their websites about how any person can make representations to them*

- 4.3 The Sub-Committee must also have regard to the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy 2014-2019, including paragraph 4.27 (hours of sales in off licences).

## **5. DETERMINATION – OPTIONS AVAILABLE TO THE SUB-COMMITTEE**

5.1 Following the hearing, having had regard to the representations made by the parties, the committee must take such of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

1. Grant the application as it stands in which case it would be issued subject to the relevant mandatory conditions and conditions consistent with the applicant's operating schedule.
2. Grant the application subject to the mandatory conditions and conditions consistent with the applicant's operating schedule, but modified to the extent the committee consider appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives. (Conditions are modified if any of them is altered or omitted or any new condition is added. Conditions must be reasonable, proportionate and appropriate in order to meet one or more of the licensing objectives.)
3. Refuse the application.

I wish to register my strong opposition to this proposal.

Firstly, perhaps you could tell me why it is that neither I nor my neighbours have received individual letters notifying us of this proposal even though it very directly affects us? I only became aware of it after reading a notice tied to a piece of street furniture.

I already suffer a considerable amount of inconvenience from this petrol station & shop.

### 1. Litter.

My drive is constantly littered with paper bags, food packaging, half eaten rolls and sandwiches, beer cans and sometimes broken bottles. ALL of these come from the petrol station shop. You can also add disposable diesel pump gloves to that list. The petrol station staff constantly clean up litter from the forecourt because it looks bad, this however is little consolation to the residents who end up with the rest of the litter in their front gardens.

### 2. Noise.

Apart from the noise of vehicles entering and leaving 24 hours a day with lorries constantly clipping the left hand kerb as they enter, there is also a good handful of idiots in cars with massively powerful sound systems who use this petrol station as a base and often sit there playing loud music and revving their engines.

Beyond that, there is the food supply lorry which calls every 24 hours. This is usually at 3-4am. The delivery driver handles the heavy wire framed baskets on wheels with absolutely no regard whatsoever to the amount of noise he is making, smashing the baskets into each other in the back of the lorry and also when getting them on and off the tail lift, then add to that the noise as they are wheeled across the forecourt to the shop entrance.

The 'tannoy' system, instead of having a small speaker in each pump, has two horn type loudspeakers high up on the shop front directly facing my property. These speakers are capable of very high sound levels. Some long time ago, after bitter complaints from me directly to the duty manager, I was told that it was company policy not to use the tannoy system except in an emergency. It all went quiet after that, but now I am periodically hearing it again for reasons which do not constitute an emergency.

### 3. Light.

The strong light from the high level canopy surround illuminates two of my bedrooms all night like a football stadium.

### Effects of this proposed change of licensing.

Allowing 24 hour access to the petrol station shop and the purchasing of alcohol will have two main effects.

1. It will allow rowdy people who have most certainly already drunk more than enough alcohol, to purchase yet more for consumption on the street, probably outside my house. These are the ONLY people who would be buying alcohol at such an hour.
2. It will very slightly boost the profits of an already very wealthy company.

### An alternative proposal from me.

CLOSE this petrol station & shop entirely between midnight and 6-30am. Very few people actually need this facility during the night.

This is a residential area, why should I and many other residents have to put up with this ? There is another BP station one mile further up the road which is not in a residential area. Noise there during the night won't bother anyone, and they can clear up their own litter.

### And to conclude.

My council tax is a very significant proportion of my entire pension and yet your service gets poorer and poorer.

Would you please stop pandering to corporate interests and profit, and actually consider the effects on the residents, i.e. the council tax payers.

I'm quite sure that if any of the council departmental managers had to put up with even a quarter of what I have to endure every day and night, they would have a very different attitude. Profits and balance sheets do not come before peoples' quality of life.

The BP station is adjacent to my property and there is also a busy bus stop by the BP entrance. There is constant rubbish from the customers of the BP station in my drive and by the bus stop. We have many times complained to BP and they do not regard it as their issue. This lack of accountability is worrying. Rubbish lands in our drive all the time. We have complained to the council too. The area is now a gateway to Heathrow and a should be a showcase to visitors, however it is socially declining.

In the last year we have noticed an increasing amount of empty small bottles of hard liquor on our drive and outside the gate. 4. The precise positions of the cameras may be agreed, subject to compliance with Data Protection legislation, with the police from time to time.
5. The system will display, on any recording, the correct time and date of the recording.
6. The CCTV system will be maintained and fully operational throughout the hours that the premises are open for any licensable activity.

The premises licence holder will at all times maintain adequate

levels of staff. Such staff levels will be disclosed, on request, to the licensing authority and police.

Adequate waste receptacles for use by customers shall be provided in and immediately outside the premises.

The premises licence holder will ensure that any age verification policy will apply to the premises whereby all cashiers will be trained to ask any customer attempting to purchase alcohol, who appears to be under the age of 25 years (or older if the licence holder so elects) to produce, before being sold alcohol, identification being a passport or photocard driving licence bearing a holographic mark or other form of identification that complies with any mandatory condition that may apply to this licence.
